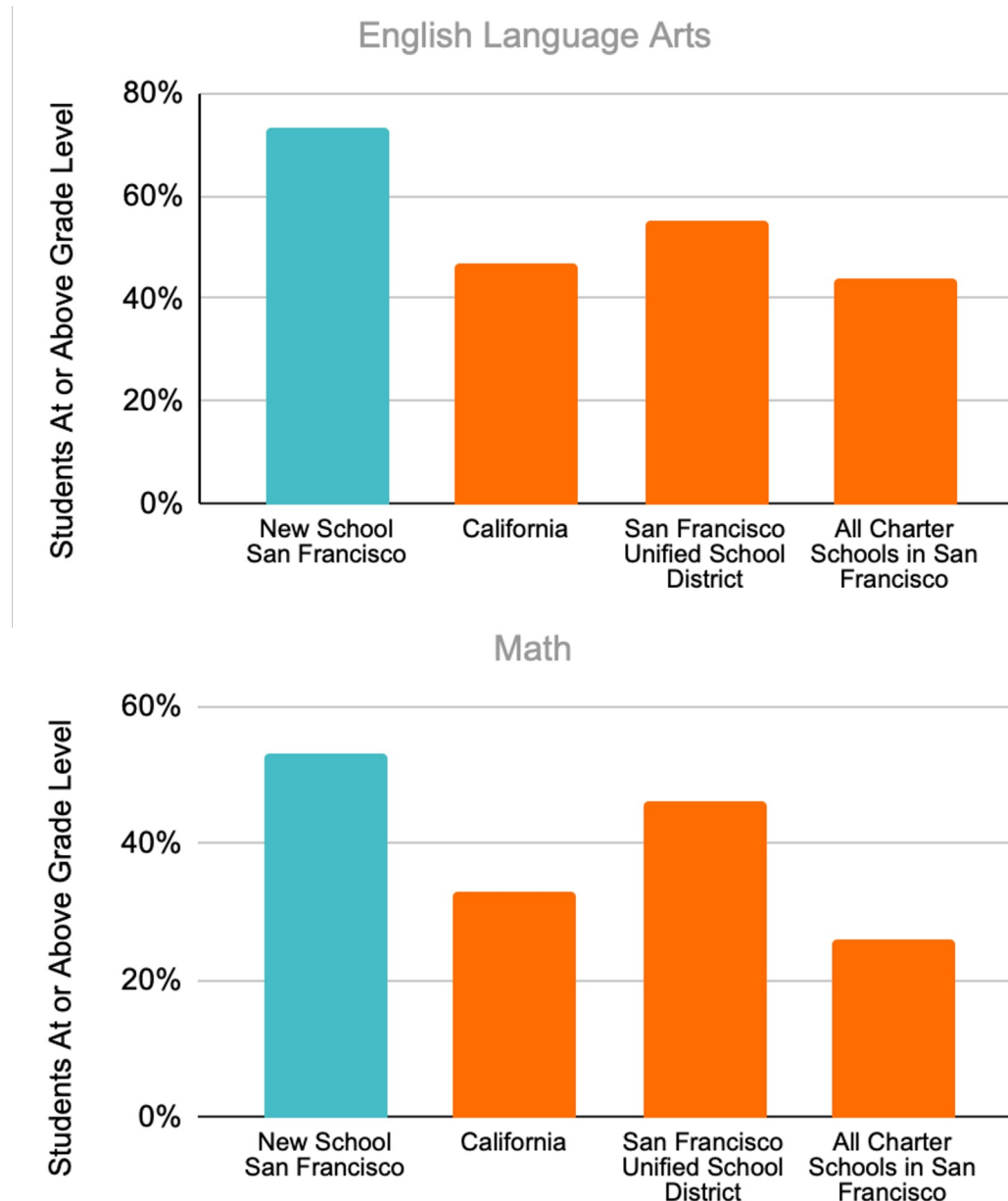

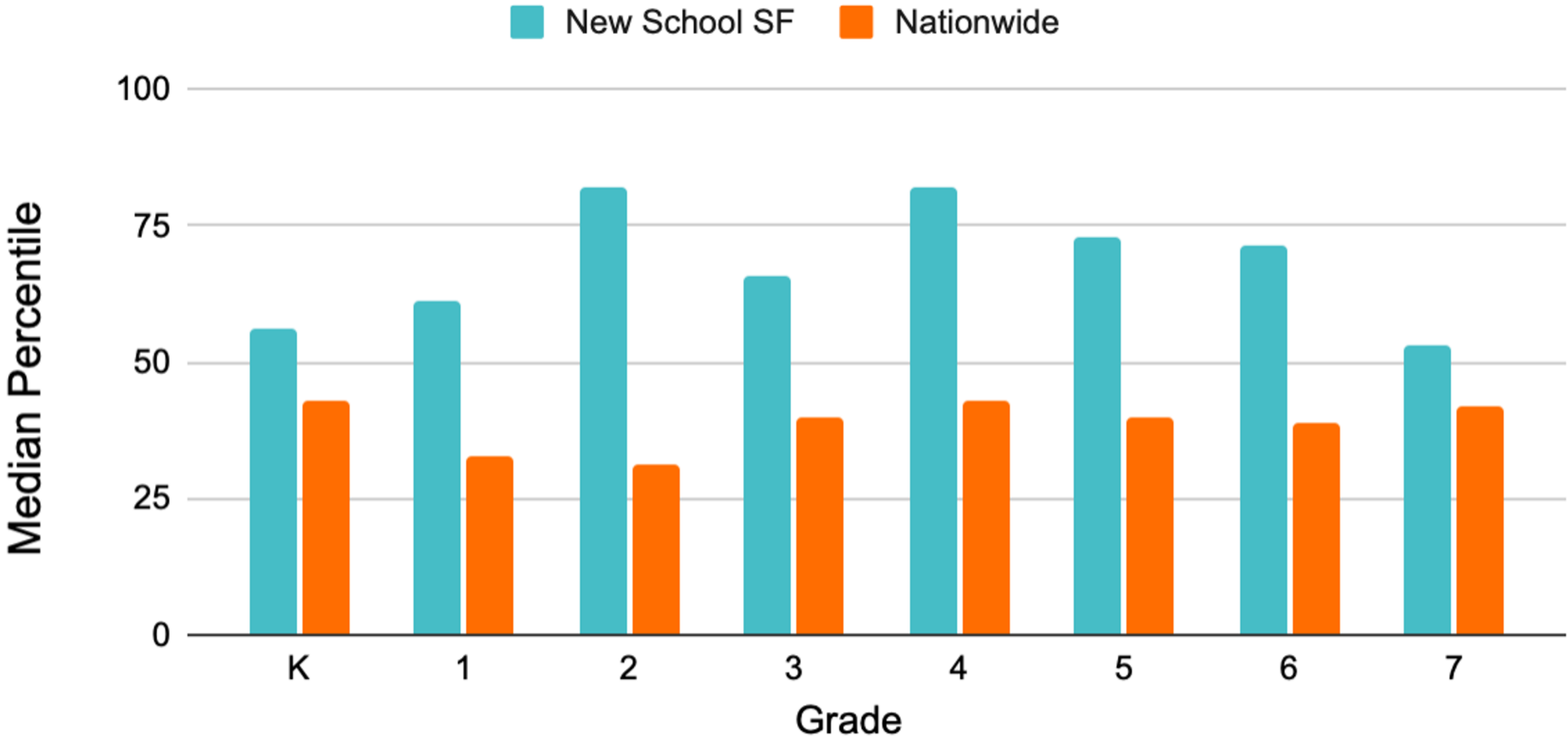
Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) Data *Spring, 2022*

What is MAP?

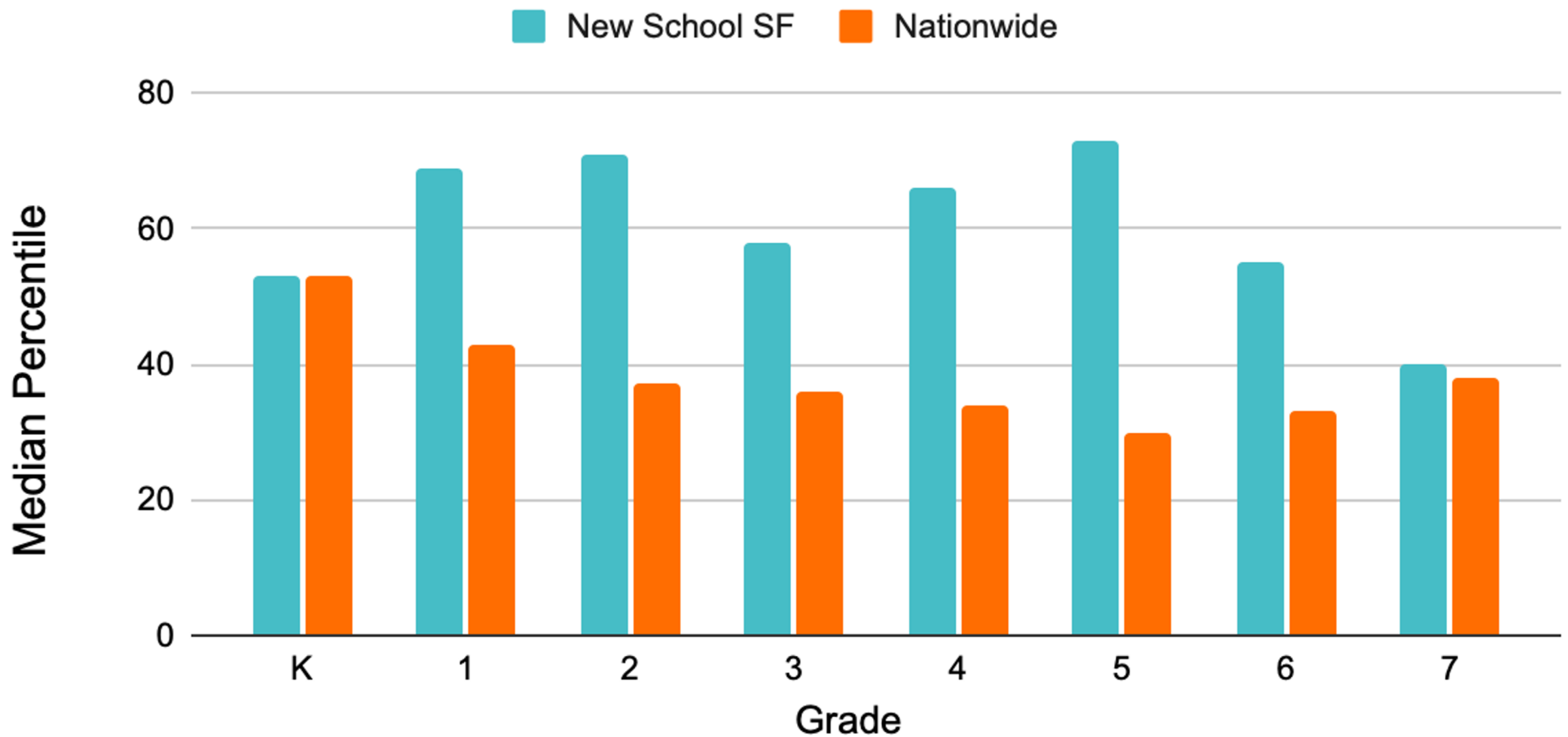
- MAP Growth is a nationally normed computer-adaptive test, which is administered multiple times per year. The purpose of MAP Growth is to determine what the student knows and how they are growing academically.
- Nearly 4.4 million student nationwide take the MAP Growth Assessment.
- All schools in the Charter School Growth Fund and NewSchools Venture Fund Portfolios administer the MAP Growth Assessment.



New School San Francisco outperformed the national median percentile in English Language Arts for all grades.



New School San Francisco outperformed national median percentile in Math for nearly all grades.

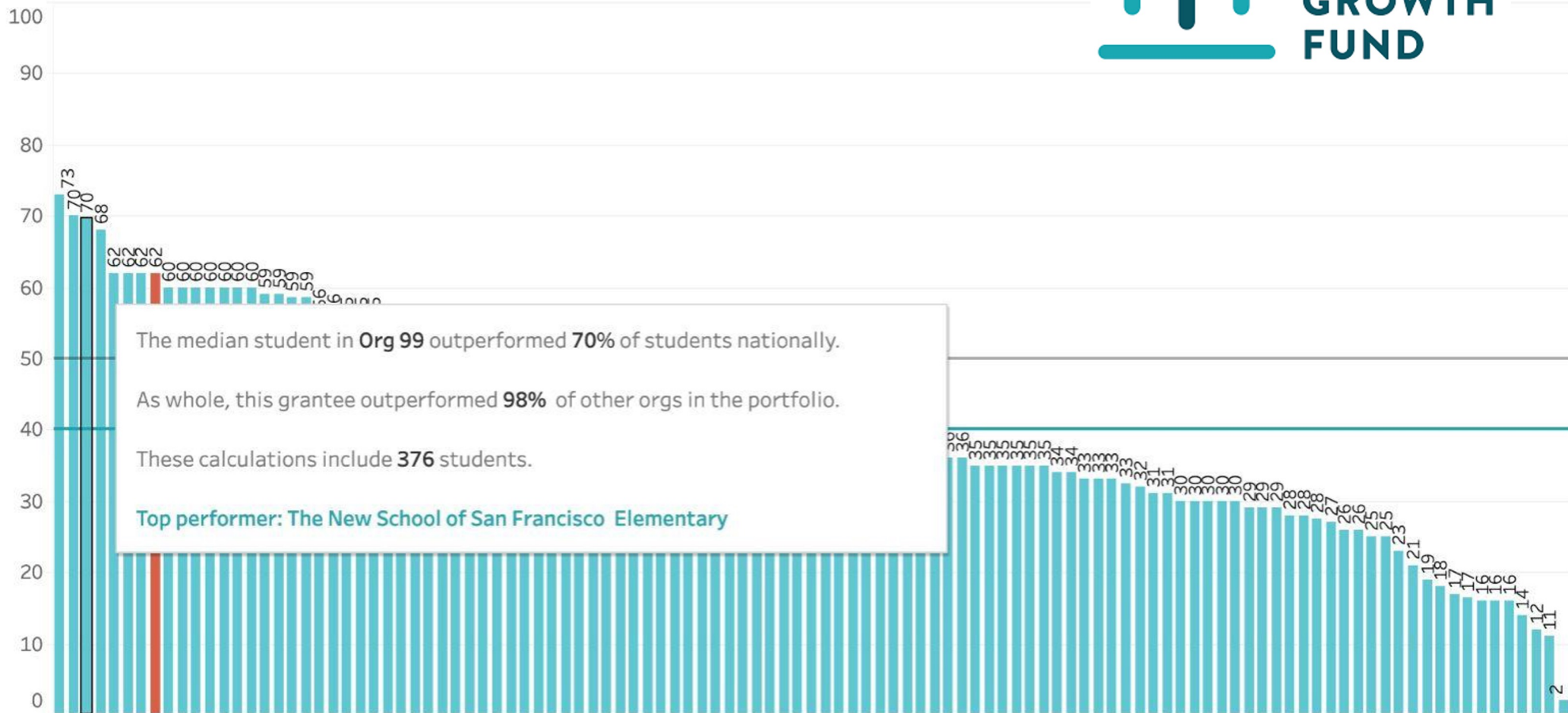


Charter Schools Growth Fund Spring Data Comparison

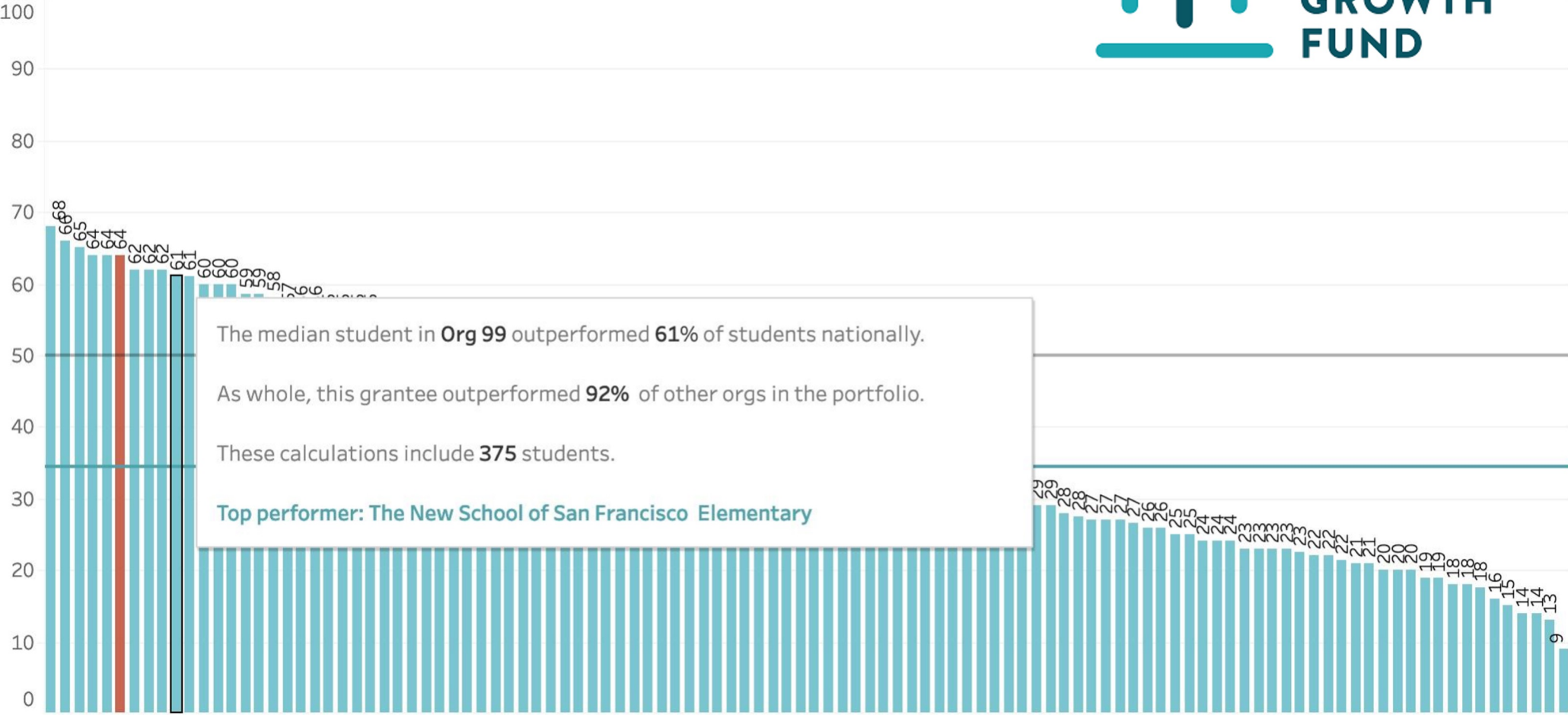
- This impressive spring data was compared nationally against 153 other high performing charter schools in the Charter School Growth Fund Portfolio.
- Overall, New School San Francisco was in the **top 10%**.
- In Language Arts, New School San Francisco **outperformed 98% of schools** in this portfolio.
- In Math, New School San Francisco **outperformed 92% of schools** in this portfolio.



New School San Francisco outperformed 98% of portfolio schools in English Language Arts.

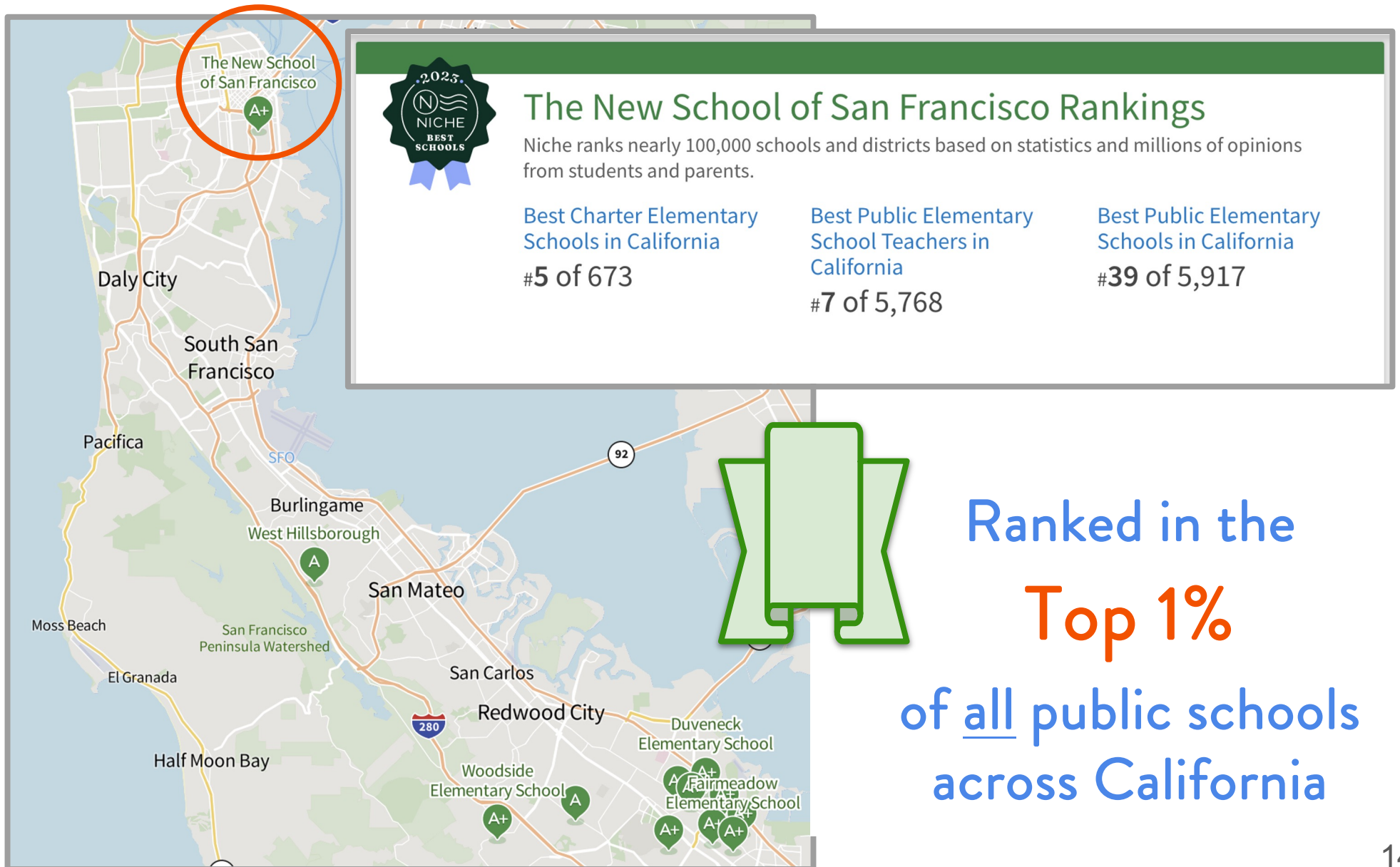


New School San Francisco outperformed 92% of portfolio schools in Math
