Winter, 2020:

- unanimously re-authorized by the CA State Board of Education and approved to expand into grades 6-8
- unanimously approved to preference families eligible for free or reduced-price lunch (up to 50%)

Spring:

- secured a \$600,000 grant from Silicon Schools Foundation
- facility for the 2020-21 year confirmed: North Beach
- school site closed due to COVID and distance learning began within 72 hours
- 98% retention of current families, even with a move
- 71% acceptance rate thus far (740 applications for K-6)

Summer:

- secured a \$750,000 grant from the William K. Bowes, Jr. Foundation and a \$300,000 grant from Brenda & Bill Younger
- Plan developed for a hybrid model for the 2020-21 school year

why middle school?

- 1 13-year commitment to students & families. Research shows consistent, personalized, student-centered & inclusive approaches are the most effective way to narrow the opportunity gap -- and that takes time.
- Continuity. Families choose NSSF because their children need a different model.

 There is no highly personalized, inclusive, inquiry-based public middle school in SF.

 Many of our students will struggle transitioning to a more traditional model.

- Stability for families. SFUSD's eight K-8 schools received 596 more applications than they had spots for. Attrition in SFUSD is the highest from 5th to 6th grade. Eliminating transitions benefits all kids, especially those facing barriers to success.
- Families need better options. The four middle schools closest to our current location -- and where the majority of our families live -- are all underperforming both the city and state's outcomes..
